possess cultural, educational, and intellectual centers of their own in order to develop sensitive systems that effectively address social-educational-economic

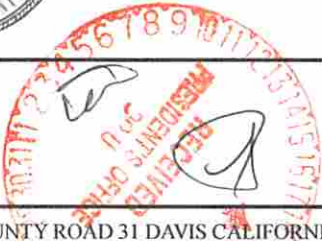

In regards to the joint initiative with Agency Tribal Nations and Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation Mendocino County Strategic Economical Agriculture Indigenous Economical Native American Pilot Tribal Nations Government 6000 jobs program. Mendocino, California in 2010 was approved for a 20 year plan in 2019 outlined in the EIR Land Development as a service to build over the course of 9 years. Head Chief, Chief Geronimo has formed our intention to take specific steps to put right imbalances that have gone unchecked for far too long by tasking us to take a positive approach in this endeavor by leading and teaching by example. Our plan is simple, direct and efficient.

First, we will preserve and focus on those surviving members of the animal community that are in the most danger and as such have been labeled as endangered. We will protect them through a well run sanctuary with its outlined sole purpose to be to restore them to their rightful place in the natural order for a failure to do so perhaps would reveal the very real situation that without them we, as humans, are also endangered.

Secondly, we will be educating- both ourselves and our brothers and sisters upon this land. The animal work within the sanctuary will be a hands-on educational experience. Our traditions passed down from our elders are practical teachings of coexistence and living in harmony with this earth and its inhabitants that we plan to reintroduce to our own people and the public at large. Red Wolf Rescue Project

The Red Wolf is the world's most endangered wolf. Red Wolf populations were decimated in the 20th century as a result of intensive predator control programs and the degradation and alteration of the species habitat. The Red Wolf has reached emergency status with only nine left in the wild. The National Academy of Sciences confirms the Red Wolf is a valid endangered species per the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The Frazier Park location will provide a natural habitat due to its location near the Los Padres National Forest which has 875,000 acres.

There is a pack of 60 wolf dog hybrids awaiting emergency rescue in New Mexico. All of these animals are descended from a red wolf that was part of a research project at UC Davis. Part of the project will include defining and isolating the red wolf genotype.

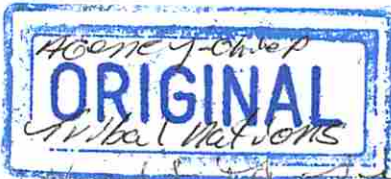

PREAMBLE

We, the Indian of the Apache, Pomo Tribes of the Mendocino Indian reservation, in order to establish our tribal organization, to conserve our tribal property, to develop our community resources, and to promote the welfare of ourselves and our descendants, propose this constitution for ratification and approval pursuant to the Self -Determination Act, 25 CFR Part 900.] And Tittle 23

ARTICLE I

This is the Apache and Pomo Tribal Nations Hereinafter referred to as Federal Land management of Mendocino Indian Reservation/Tribal Nations Mendocino (FLMMIRTNM) Tribal Government

ARTICLE II TERRITORY

The Homeland of the Pomo and Apache shall include the present Reservation and such land that are traditionally homeland and as may be legally added thereto.]

ARTICLE III Dual Membership and [Citizenship]

Section 1. All [Apache and Pomo] the following persons are Eligible For enrollment [as citizens of the Nations]

Section 2. The Tribal Council has enacted a citizenship Ordinance, The following will be added and put in the Citizenship ordinance)

[Put into Ordinance] Section 2. No person, who is otherwise qualified, shall be enrolled if, by reason of citizenship in another tribe or band he/she has received benefits or shared in the assets of such tribe band, except through inheritance.

[Put into Ordinance] Section 3. The official citizenship roll shall be prepared [Open Enrollment] in accordance with an Ordinance adopted by the citizens of the nations. Such Ordinance shall provide for an enrollment Committee and set forth the procedures to be used in effecting enrollment and keep the roll current.]



[Put into Ordinance] Section 4. Any person who wishes to withdraw from citizenship in the Nations must submit his withdrawal in writing to the tribal Council Chairperson who shall direct the enrollment Committee to adjust its records accordingly.]

ARTICLE IV GOVERNING BODY

The governing body of the Tribe Council composed of the following five (5) Officers of the Tribe: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, and one (1) Councilperson. Except for the first election as provided in Article VI, Section 1. All members of the tribe Council shall be elected for 2 years or until their successor is duly elected and installed. The Tribe Council shall determine its own procedures and shall be authorized to act on all matters in which the Tribe is empowered to act, except as otherwise provided in this Constitution.

Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, the powers of the [Nations], including those powers specifically mentioned in this Constitution and shall be exercised by the Tribal Council.

ARTICLE V POWERS

Section 1. The Tribal Government shall have such powers as may be authorized by the Indians Reorganization Act of June 18, 1934, 48 stat. 984), and such powers and responsibility hereinafter provided, subject to any limitation imposed by the statue of the Iroquois Constitution of Tribal Nations:

- a. Prevent the sale, disposition, lease or encumbrance of the tribal land, interest in land, or other tribal assets.*
- b. To manage, lease, Contract, or otherwise deal with tribal assets and community resources. Towards this end a land assignment ordinance representative.*
- c. To employ the legal Chief of the choice of counsel and fixing of fees to be subject to the approval of the Federal Contractor [as noted in 25 CFR PART 900 Contractor Policies] or his duly authorized representative.*
- d. To enact the ordinance, consistent with this Constitution governing future membership, loss of membership and adopting of members, [Known Member as Citizenship].*
- e. To assess fees for the payment of expenses of the tribe or to finance any project which in its opinion is for the benefit of the tribe as a whole.*
- f. To establish or join an establishment housing authority.*
- g. To take such action as are necessary to carry into effect any of the foregoing powers and to notify the members of the tribe of action taken.*



ARTICLE VI DUTIES OF THE TRIBAL COUNCIL

Section 1. Chief

- a. The Chief shall preside at all meetings of the general council and the tribal Government. The general council shall consist of eligible Members of the tribe.*
- b. shall execute on behalf of the tribe all contracts, and other documents approved by the*
- c. Chief appointing tribal Government council or the general council.*
- d. shall have general supervision of all other officers, employment and committee of the tribe and see that their duties are properly performed.*
- e. When neither the general nor tribal council is in session, he shall be the official representative of the tribe.*
- f. The Chief shall vote at the general and tribal council meeting to confirm the votes.*
- g. (To be added)*

Section 2. Vice-Chair: The Vice-Chairperson, in the absence of the Chief, shall have the power and authority of the Chief and may, if authorized by the Chief, assist the chairperson in the performance of his duties.

Section 3. Secretary CIO/ CFO Treasury

The treasurer shall keep the minutes of all general and tribal council meetings. Shall certify the enactment of all notices required by the constitution. Shall receive all petitions for in the constitution of the tribe on behalf of the general council Shall attend to the giving of all notices required by the constitution. Copies of all minutes, resolutions or other enactments shall be submitted to the federal Contractor to further submit to (DOI) as soon after enactment as possible. Shall have care and custody of all tribally owned valuables of the reservation. Shall carry out the financial directives of the tribal council or the general council, receive local monies of the tribe and keep an accurate account of receipts and disbursements. Shall deposit funds in a tribal account, in a local bank selected by the general council, where depositors' funds are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Shall give a financial report at all general council meetings and all financial records shall be available for the inspection by officers of the tribal council, members of the tribe and representative of the Contractor and Secretary.

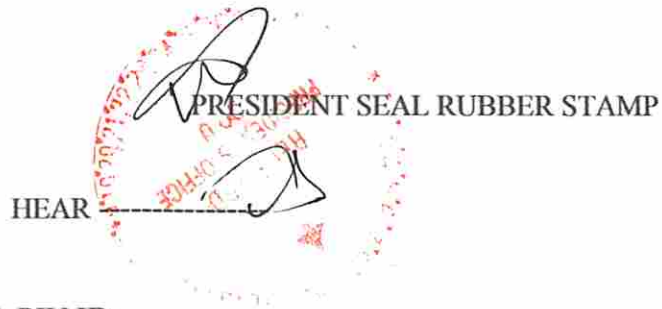

“§ 3605. Program to encourage innovative solutions to enhance electronic Government services and processes

“(a) ESTABLISHMENT OF PROGRAM.—The Administrator shall establish and promote a Governmentwide program to encourage contractor innovation and excellence in facilitating the development and enhancement of electronic Government services and processes.

“(b) ISSUANCE OF ANNOUNCEMENTS SEEKING INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS.—Under the program, the Administrator, in consultation with the Council and the Administrator for Federal Procurement Policy, shall issue announcements seeking unique and innovative solutions to facilitate the development and enhancement of electronic Government services and processes.

“(c) MULTIAGENCY TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TEAM.—

(1) The Administrator, in consultation with the Council and the Administrator for Federal Procurement Policy, shall convene a multiagency technical assistance team to assist in screening proposals submitted to the Administrator to provide unique and innovative solutions to facilitate the development and enhancement of electronic Government services and processes. The team shall be composed of employees of the agencies represented on the Council who have expertise in scientific and technical disciplines that would facilitate the assessment of the feasibility of the proposals.

“(B) submit each proposal, and the assessment of the proposal, to the Administrator.

(3) The technical assistance team shall not consider or evaluate proposals submitted in response to a solicitation for offers for a pending procurement or for a specific agency requirement.

(4) After receiving proposals and assessments from the technical assistance team, the Administrator shall consider recommending appropriate proposals for funding under the E-Government Fund established under section 3604 or, if appropriate, forward the proposal and the assessment of it to the executive agency whose mission most coincides with the subject matter of the proposal.

(3) Areas of performance measurement that agencies should consider include— (A) customer service; (B) agency productivity; and (C) adoption of innovative information technology, including the appropriate use of commercial best practices.

(4) Agencies shall link their performance goals, as appropriate, to key groups, including citizens, businesses, and other governments, and to internal Federal Government operations. (5) As

appropriate, agencies shall work collectively in linking their performance goals to groups identified under paragraph (4) and shall use information technology in delivering Government information and services to those groups.

(a) AVOIDING DIMINISHED ACCESS.—

When promulgating policies and implementing programs regarding the provision of Government information and services over the Internet, agency heads shall consider the impact on persons without access to the Internet, and shall, to the extent practicable—

(1) ensure that the availability of Government information and services has not been diminished for individuals who lack access to the Internet; and (2) pursue alternate modes of delivery that make Government information and services more accessible to individuals who do not own computers or lack access to the Internet. NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF STANDARDS AND TECHNOLOGY. Section 20 of the National Institute of Standards and Technology Act (15 U.S.C. 278g-3), is amended by striking the text and inserting the following:

“(a) IN GENERAL.—The Institute shall— “(1) have the mission of developing standards, guidelines, and associated methods and techniques for information systems; “(2) develop standards and guidelines, including minimum requirements, for information systems used or operated by an agency or by a contractor of an agency or other organization on behalf of an agency, other than national security systems (as defined in section 3542(b)(2) of title 44, United States Code); and “(3) develop standards and guidelines, including minimum requirements, for providing adequate information security for all agency operations and assets, but such standards and guidelines. Instead of the PIV Card, SP 800-157 provides an alternative token, which can be implemented and deployed directly with mobile devices (such as smart phones and tablets). The PIV credential associated with this alternative token is called a Derived PIV Credential. The use of a different type of token greatly improves the usability of electronic authentication from mobile devices to remote IT resources.

Derived PIV Credentials are based on the general concept of derived credentials in SP 800-63-2, which leverages identity proofing and vetting results of current and valid credentials. When applied to PIV, identity proofing and vetting processes do not have to be repeated to issue a Derived PIV Credential. Instead, the user proves possession of a valid PIV Card to receive a Derived PIV Credential. To achieve interoperability with the PIV infrastructure and its applications, a Derived PIV Credential is a PKI credential.²

¹ A mobile device, for the purpose of this document is a portable computing device that: (i) has a small form factor such that it can easily be carried by a single individual; (ii) is designed to operate without a physical connection (e.g., wirelessly transmit or receive information); (iii) possesses local, non-removable or removable data storage; and (iv) includes a self-contained power source. Mobile devices may also include voice communication capabilities, on-board sensors that allow the devices to capture information, and/or built-in features for synchronizing local data with remote locations. Examples include smart phones, tablets, and e-readers. ² While the PIV Card may be used as the basis for issuing other types of derived credentials, the issuance of these other credentials is outside the scope of this document. Only derived credentials issued in accordance with this document are considered to be PIV credentials

4 9. This AGREEMENT confirms the commitment by the parties to overcome all impediments to a

6 this AGREEMENT include.

- 7 (1) enhancing and improving communication between the parties,
8 (2) facilitating the resolution of issues to avoid potentially adverse effects on any party, and
9 (3) working toward greater public recognition, respect, and support for Tribal self-governance and self-

11 10. This AGREEMENT is intended to build confidence among the parties in the government-to-
12 government relationships by outlining a process for its implementation. It is also intended to solidify such

19 This AGREEMENT provides the foundation and framework for further and more specific agreements

22 12. In furthering the objective of positive government-to-government relationships, the State of Alaska

- 24 (a) Each Tribe has its own independent form of government and exercises inherent sovereign authority.

26 informed and sensitive manner, respectful of Tribal sovereignty and Alaska Native traditional and cultural
27 values, beliefs, and principles; and
28 (c) The development of strong, reliable government-to-government relationships between the Tribal
Contractor and the Tribal Nations Head Chief will be beneficial to all native in Mendocino County.

13. In furthering the objective of positive government-to-government relationships, the Tribes
acknowledge that:

- (a) The federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation operates under the authority given





1 by the United States Constitution, and Tribal Nations government Federal Land Management of
2 Mendocino Indian reservation Constitution, and Tribal laws and regulations.

3 (b) The Mendocino County has a major responsibility to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of all

d) Develop and sponsor programs to inform Tribal members/citizens and non-Tribal citizens of the

30. The parties agree to work with the Mendocino Inter-Tribal Council (AI-TC) to provide logistical support, coordination, and facilitation of meetings of the parties.

VI. SOVEREIGNTY AND DISCLAIMERS

31. In executing this AGREEMENT, no party waives any rights, including treaty rights, immunities, sovereign immunities, or jurisdiction it may possess. This AGREEMENT in no way diminishes any rights or protections afforded any persons or entities, or , under applicable tribal Nations Government and Tribal, Contractor, federal, or international law. Through the provisions of this AGREEMENT the parties strengthen their collective ability to successfully address and resolve issues of mutual concern. This agreement is a policy directive and does not create legally binding or enforceable rights. By signing this AGREEMENT parties or making an admission, this document may be used in Tribal Court of law.

32. The government-to-government relationships between the Tribes and the Tribal Contractor shall in no way alter or diminish the unique relationship that Tribal governments have with the federal government or any other government.

VII. RESOLUTION OF DISPUTES AND AMENDMENTS

33. Conflicts or disputes between parties pertaining to the meaning, interpretation, or methodology of this AGREEMENT will be brought before the Tribal Nations Government Forum Head Chief SEAL and approval .

34. Each Tribe has the right to elevate an issue of importance to any executive decision-making authority of the Tribal Government . The Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation has the right to elevate an issue of importance to any decision-making authority of the Tribe concerned.

(A) Public Law 280 did not divest the Tribe of its inherent sovereign authority to establish our own laws and enforce them.

(B) There is a need to ensure law and order on the Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation..

(C) This Ordinance is adopted to ensure law and order for all tribal members, residents and visitors to the Reservation. It is the policy of the Tribe that Reservation residents and visitors are entitled to security against harm.

(D) The adoption and enforcement of a Law-and-Order Ordinance is necessary to maintain peace and order on the Reservation. The adoption of this Ordinance is in the best interest of the members of the Tribe and furthers the Tribe's sovereignty and administration of justice. This Ordinance promotes the health and safety of the members of the Tribe.

Section 1.02 Adoption of New Law and Order Ordinance A new Ordinance entitled "Law and Order Ordinance" is hereby added to the Tribe's Tribal Code under Title 8 and shall provide as follows:



CHAPTER 1. CONSTRUCTION, AND JURISDICTION

Section 1.01 Liberal Constructions

This Ordinance will be liberally construed to give full effect to the purposes for which it was enacted and shall be interpreted and construed to preserve the peace, safety, health and general welfare of the people of the Tribe and those on the Reservation. This Ordinance is intended to ensure peace and order on the Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation and promote the welfare of the Tribe and its members. This Ordinance is also intended to safeguard individual rights and community standards, and to ensure that all parties are treated fairly and without prejudice, protecting individual rights guaranteed by the Indian Civil Rights Act and by the traditions, customs and laws of the Tribe. This Ordinance will provide an orderly procedure for resolving conflicts which reflects tribal customs and traditions as well as the prevailing community standards, and which affords all affected persons a fair, prompt, and impartial hearing. Finally, this Ordinance is intended to exert jurisdiction over all matters essential to the Tribe's self-determination and self-governance.

Section 1.02 Jurisdictions

The Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation Quorum Court shall have jurisdiction over all violations under this Ordinance. This Ordinance will be applicable to all persons and lands within the exterior boundaries of Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation assist Tribal Universities and Properties and as not limited to only by the Tribal Government Constitution and applicable federal law. This jurisdiction shall be concurrent with any valid jurisdiction by courts of the United States and the state of California.

CHAPTER 2. DEFINITIONS

(A) "Alter" means to change, modify, or vary in some degree; to change some of the elements, ingredients or details without substituting an entirely new thing or destroying the identity of the thing affected.

(B) "Bodily injury" means: cut, abrasion, bruise, burn, physical pain; or causing illness, impairment of a function of a bodily member, organ, or mental faculty; or any other injury to the body, no matter how temporary.

(C) "Violation" means a violation of tribal law as set forth in this Ordinance.

(D) "Controlled substance" means any drug or other substance, under the provisions of Chapter 13, Title 21, Section 802, "Controlled Substance" of the United States Code.



(E) "Damage" means loss, injury, or deterioration to property causing it to decrease in strength, value, amount or quality.

(F) "Dangerous drug" means any drug that is included in Chapter 13, Title 21, Section 802, "Dangerous Drug" schedules I, II, III, IV, or V of the United States Code. This term includes a device or a drug that bears or is required to bear the legend:

- i. Caution: Federal law prohibits dispensing without a prescription; or
- ii. Caution: Federal law restricts this drug to use by or on the order of a licensed veterinarian.

(G) "Dangerous Weapon" means any firearm, or other weapon, device, material or substance, whether animate or inanimate, which in the manner it is used or intended to be used is known to be capable of producing death or serious bodily injury.

(H) "Destroy" means to ruin the structure, organic existence or condition of a thing or property, to demolish to injure or mutilate beyond possibility of use.

(I) "Deface" means damage to monuments, buildings or other structures by changing the physical appearance. (J) "Drug Paraphernalia" means any equipment, products, and materials of any kind that are used, intended for use, or designed for use in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance or dangerous or narcotic drug.

(K) "Elder" means a person over the age of 51.

(L) "Exclude" means to ban or forbid a person from being present on the Tribal Government Federal Land Management Of Mendocino Indian Reservation or Tribal University incorporated in this ordinance.

(M) "Firearm" means any device, designed to be used as a weapon, from which is expelled through a barrel, a projectile by the force of any explosion or other form of combustion. Firearm does not mean a BB device.

(N) "Tribal Government" is the 3 member Quorum Board under Article 4 of the Tribal Government Constitution. The Tribal Government is the Tribe's governing body.

(O) "Financial loss" means a loss of money or decrease in financial value.

(P) "Marijuana" means all parts of the plant *Cannabis saliva* L. whether growing or not, under the provision of Chapter 13, Title 21, Section 802, "Marijuana" of the United States Code.



(Q) "Motor Vehicle" or "Vehicle" includes automobiles, motorcycles, ATVs, trucks, and all other forms of motorized transportation.

(R) "Narcotic drug" means any drug under the provision of Chapter 13, Title 21, Section 802, "Narcotic Drug" of the United States Code.

(S) "Owner" means a person holding title to real or Tribal Government property. In the case of real property, Owner shall include a lessee or assignee of property under an assignment or valid lease from the Tribe or the Owner. In cases of uncertainty, "Owner" shall mean the Tribe.

(T) "Private Property" means any property owned in fee, individual land where title is held in the name of the United States in trust for the individual (allotments), and for purposes of this Ordinance only Tribal Property leased from the Tribal Government Board and Ordinance herein attached Tribal University Property as applied to D-Q University By-laws .

(U) "Property" means:

i. Real property such as land or structures and building affixed to land and includes both tribal and private;

ii. Personal property which is anything tangible or that can be severed from real property.

(V) "Reservation" means all lands within the exterior boundaries of the Federal Land Management of Mendocino Indian Reservation and assistance to Mike Williams D-Q University and all lands claimed by the Tribe to which the Tribe may establish title.

(W) "Recklessly" means a person who acts carelessly, heedlessly, or is inattentive to the circumstances surrounding him or her.

(X) "Serious Bodily Injury" means: Bodily Injury, which involves: a substantial risk of death; extreme physical pain or disfigurement; or protracted loss or impairment of the function of a bodily member, organ, or mental facility.

(Y) "Tribal Court" means the Chief Justice judiciary branch of the Tribal Government as set forth and provided for under the Tribal Government Constitution.

(Z) "Tribal Property" as used in this Ordinance means all property held by Tribal Government land owned by the Tribal Government Tribal structures, buildings, facilities, dwellings and all personal property of the Tribe's Reservation or Universities.

(AA) "Tribal Police Officer" means a person designated by the Tribal Government to enforce this Ordinance and to act as a law enforcement officer for the Tribe.
